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American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

The information contained in this document is compiled from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. This bill was signed into law by President Obama on February 17, 2009

This summary includes information on funding opportunities that will be made available through grants and other direct assistance programs to state and local governments, institutions of elementary, secondary, and higher education, and other community non-profit organizations. Additionally, there is a Federal Contracts section that outlines funding that will be distributed to various Federal agencies for procuring goods and services. At this time, this summary does not contain information regarding:

- Funding for Administrative and Operational Costs of Federal Agencies
- Funding for loan programs with no grant component
- Funding for research and development activities with no competitive grant component
- Funding that will be distributed to individuals via, for example, tax credits, Medicare/Medicaid payments, emergency assistance, etc.

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SUMMARY

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 will provide \$789 billion in thoughtful and carefully targeted priority investments with unprecedented accountability measures built in. How funds are spent, program managers, all announcements of contract and grant competitions and awards, and formula grant allocations must be posted on a special website created by the President at www.recovery.gov.

President Barack Obama explained his vision for the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 at George Mason University on January 8, 2009 and stated:

I am confident [this plan] will save or create at least 3 million jobs over the next few years. It is not just another public works program. It's a plan that recognizes both the paradox and the promise of this moment — the fact that there are millions of Americans trying to find work, even as, all around the country, there is so much work to be done. That's why we'll invest in priorities like energy and education, health care and a new infrastructure that are necessary to keep us strong and competitive in the 21st century. That's why the overwhelming majority of the jobs created will be in the private sector, while our plan will save the public-sector jobs of teachers, cops, firefighters and others who provide vital services. Every American will be able to hold Washington accountable for these decisions by going online to see how and where their tax dollars are being spent and that the economic recovery plan is free from earmarks and pet projects. In part, the plan looks to the following four areas:

Infrastructure: The plan looks to repairing crumbling roads, bridges and schools by eliminating the backlog of projects and expanding broadband access across the country.

Energy: The plan looks to doubling the production of alternative energy in the next three years by modernizing more than 75 percent of federal building and improving energy efficiency of 2 million homes which would save consumers and taxpayers billions of dollars. In the process, there will be and job opportunities for building solar panels, wind turbines, and fuel efficient cars and buildings and developing the new energy technologies that will lead to even more jobs

Education: The plan looks to equip tens of thousands of schools, community colleges and public universities with 21st century classrooms, labs and libraries.

Health care: The plan looks to computerize all of the country's medical records within five years which will cut waste, eliminate red tape and reduce the need to repeat expensive medical tests in addition to saving lives by reducing the deadly but preventable medical errors that pervade our health care system.

Priority consideration will be given to areas of the Nation that have experienced sudden and severe economic dislocation and job loss due to corporate restructuring.

\$12.1 Billion

- **Broadband Technology Opportunities Program:** \$4.7 billion for formula funding and competitive grants for the purposes of: (A) providing access to broadband service to citizens residing in unserved areas of the United States; (B) providing improved access to broadband service to citizens residing in underserved areas of the United States; and (C) providing broadband education, awareness, training, access, equipment, and support to (i) schools, libraries, medical and healthcare providers, community colleges and other institutions of higher education, and other community support organizations and entities to facilitate greater use of broadband service by or through these organizations; (ii) organizations and agencies that provide outreach, access, equipment, and support services to facilitate greater use of broadband service by low-income, unemployed, aged, and otherwise vulnerable populations; and (iii) job-creating strategic facilities located within a State-designated economic zone, Economic Development District, Renewal Community or Empowerment Zone, or Enterprise Community.

\$7.7 Billion

- **Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants:** \$3.2 billion, of which \$2.8 billion will be available through formula grants to provide for rehabilitation of certain existing residential and commercial buildings, to increase their energy efficiency so that it is in line with specified standards. The remaining \$400 million will be awarded on a competitive basis.

 - A local educational agency that receives funds under this title may use the funds for any activity authorized by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), or the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006 (the Perkins Act). A local educational agency may not use funds for capital projects unless authorized by ESEA, IDEA, or the Perkins Act.
 - A public institution of higher education that receives funds under this title shall use the funds for education and general expenditures, and in such a way as to mitigate the need to raise tuition and fees for in-State students. An institution of higher education may not use funds received under this title to increase its endowment or for construction, renovation, or facility repair.

TRANSPORTATION

\$46.3 Billion

- **Discretionary Grants for a National Surface Transportation System:** \$1.5 billion will be awarded to State and local governments on a competitive basis for projects that will have a significant impact on the Nation, a metropolitan area, or a region. Projects eligible for funding include, but are not limited to: (1) Highway or bridge projects including (a) interstate rehabilitation, (b) improvements to the rural collector road system, (c) the reconstruction of overpasses and interchanges, (d) bridge replacements, (e) seismic retrofit projects for bridges, and (f) road realignments; (2) public transportation projects including investments in projects participating in the New Starts or Small Starts programs; (3) passenger and freight rail transportation projects; and (4) port infrastructure investments including projects that connect ports to other modes of transportation and improve the efficiency of freight movement.

Flow of funding: Federal competitive to States and Local Agencies

- **Funding for Airport Facilities and Equipment:** \$200 million in funding to make improvements to power systems, air route traffic control centers, air traffic control towers, terminal radar approach control facilities, and navigation and landing equipment. Priority will be given to projects or activities that will be completed within 2 years. Funding may be provided through grants in addition to the other instruments. No cost-sharing is required. The process for applying, reviewing and awarding grants and cooperative and other transaction agreements must be made available within 60 days of the enactment of the Act.

- **Grants for Highway Investment:** \$27.5 billion in formula funding to States for highway restoration, repair, construction and other activities. Of this amount, \$60,000,000 as competitive discretionary grants to States; \$500,000,000 is allocated for investments in transportation at Indian reservations and Federal lands; \$320,000,000 is allocated for the Indian Reservation Roads program; \$100,000,000 is allocated for the Park Roads and Parkways program; \$70,000,000 is allocated for the Forest Highway Program, and \$10,000,000 is allocated for the Refuge Roads program. Funds will be apportioned to States using a formula. States must allocate funds within 180 days or the Secretary of Transportation will withdraw from the State

an amount equal to 50% of the funds awarded to that grantee less the amount of funding obligated. The Secretary will then redistribute such amounts to other States that have had no funds withdrawn.

- **Grants to States for Intercity Passenger Rail Service:** \$8 billion for discretionary grants to States to pay for specific projects which they must identify on a Statewide Transportation Improvement Plan at the time of application to the program. The Secretary of Transportation must give priority to projects that demonstrate an ability to be completed within 2 years and to projects that improve the safety and reliability of intercity passenger trains. No cost-sharing is required.

- **Capital Grants to The National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak):** \$1.3 billion for immediate investment in capital projects necessary to maintain and improve national intercity passenger rail service, including the rehabilitation of rolling stock. Funds made available under this heading must be allocated directly to the National Railroad Passenger Corporation.

HEALTH INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY
